

Aller- to go

NOT AN -ER VERB!



Je <u>vais</u>	I go, I am going	Je <u>vais</u> à un stade.
Tu <u>vas</u>	you go, you are going	<u>Vas</u> -tu à la boum?
Il/Elle <u>va</u>	He/she goes, he/she is going	Sophie <u>va</u> à l'église.
Nous <u>allons</u>	we go, we are going	Nous <u>allons</u> au café.
Vous <u>allez</u>	you go, you are going	Vous <u>allez</u> au restaurant.
Ils/Elles <u>vont</u>	they go, they are going	Ils ne <u>vont</u> pas à la piscine.

EXAMPLES:

Je vais au supermarché. (I am going to the super market.)

Nous allons à la plage. (we are going to the beach.)

Ils ne vont pas à la bibliothèque! (they are not going to the library!)

- Remember that **aller** is used in asking people how they feel.

Ça va? (How are you?)

Comment vas-tu? (How are you? ~ litte more formal)

Je vais bien. (I am good.)

Comment allez-vous? (How are you? ~ MUST USE ANYONE YOU DO NOT KNOW OR ARE OLDER THAN YOU!!!)

- Aller is used in many common expressions

To encourage someone or to do something:

Vas-y! (Come on! Go ahead! Do it!)

To tell someone to go away:

Va-t'en! (Go away!)
